Mission National Veterans Wheelchair Games



The National Veterans Wheelchair Games is co-presented between the Department of Veterans Affairs and Paralyzed Veterans of America. The Games serve Veterans with Spinal Cord Injury, Multiple Sclerosis, Amputations and other central neurological impairments with the goal to increase their independence, healthy activity and quality of life through wheelchair sports

and recreation. Veterans are being exposed to wheelchair sports at their home VAMC or PVA Chapters as part of their rehabilitation to improve function, independence and getting them active in their home communities in sport and fitness.

The Wheelchair Games. From July 30 – August 4, 2018, the Paralyzed Veterans of America Central Florida Chapter and the Orlando VA Medical center are hosting the 38th National Veterans' Wheelchair Games held at the Orange County Convention Center, in Orlando, Florida. Over 725 wheelchair-bound veterans, the largest number of wheelchair athletes ever to participate in the games will be coming to our area to compete for five days in 19 different sporting events. The event is free to the public and all are welcome. The games focus on improving the quality of life for veterans with physical disabilities and for fostering better health through sports and recreation. District 6980 is supporting the event as a combined club service project and is asking for funds and volunteers. They are asking for volunteers to greet the athletes, their caregivers, and families as they arrive at Orlando International airport on Sunday July 29, 2018. Karen and I plan to volunteer, and we welcome any of you who are willing to join us. Please sign the signup sheets forum at each table if you are available to volunteer and we will submit the names to the District. In addition, we will be discussing a contribution with the board at the next meeting on July 26.

1. Positive Impressions Are Like Seeds

6. YOU Will Know

Even if you never see a person you have treated with rudeness or bad behavior again, YOU will know. It will be on your mind and heart when you walk into a meeting and try to convince the people in the room they should put their faith in you. Your belief in yourself will be compromised and the negative energy you carry with you will ultimately manifest in some way to your disadvantage.

Be the role model for being nice to others. The energy of consistently being nice to others will return to you many times over - in your health, in your business and simply making the world a better place.

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That is the POWER of nice.

OUR ROTARY FAMILY



Doug Trovillion's food-truck events span five counties in Central Florida — from a monthly roundup in Celebration (<u>Osceola County</u>) to a quarterly gathering in New Smyrna Beach (Volusia).

The 56-year-old has been

organizing <u>Kona Food Truck Luaus</u>, which can sometimes bring in 40 or more mobile kitchens, since 2011. He holds 11 monthly, six quarterly and seven special events, as well as organizes the food trucks for the Orlando Magic and Orlando City Soccer games.

"I'm still having fun with it," Trovillion said. "It keeps me young. It is hard work, but I'm not afraid of hard work." He tries to rotate the type of trucks and meal styles at each event. Coordinating with 100plus business owners can be a little like "herding cats," said Trovillion, a food-truck owner himself.

Trovillion gives new-to-him vendors a trial period at smaller rallies to get them through "the learning curve."

"They don't realize how much work it is to be consistent," he said.

Trovillion loves to watch as each food-truck grows, hones in on its concept and eventually becomes a brick-and-mortar business.

"It's a nice little family," he said.

And, on Saturday, August 18, Doug will take his hot dog food truck to Edgewood for the kids to have Hot Dog day – which they truly love! Windermere Rotary will bring the drinks so put it on your calendar. Thank you, Doug!
