

What impact do the new variants of the COVID-19 virus have on vaccines?

The COVID-19 vaccines that are currently in development or have been approved are expected to provide at least <u>some protection against new virus variants</u> because these vaccines elicit a broad immune response involving a range of antibodies and cells. Therefore, changes or mutations in the virus should not make vaccines completely ineffective. In the event that any of these vaccines prove to be less effective against one or more variants, it will be possible to change the composition of the vaccines to protect against these variants.

Data continues to be collected and analysed on new variants of the COVID-19 virus. WHO is working with researchers, health officials and scientists to understand how these variants affect the virus's behaviour, including their impact on the effectiveness of vaccines, if any.

Latest News From Washington:

The United States announced Monday it will lift Covid travel bans on all air passengers in November if they are fully vaccinated and undergo testing and contact tracing.

Jeffrey Zients, coronavirus response coordinator for President Joe Biden, told reporters the new "consistent approach" would take effect "early November."

The easing of travel restrictions, imposed 18 months ago by Donald Trump as the Covid-19 pandemic first erupted, marks a significant shift by Biden and answers a major demand from European allies at a time of strained diplomatic relations.

Numerous safeguards will remain in place to suppress the spread of the virus, which has already killed more than 670,000 Americans and is resurgent after what many had hoped was a lasting dip earlier this year.

"Most importantly, foreign nationals flying to the US will be required to be fully vaccinated," Zients said.

John Whyte: There's a lot of misinformation out there, especially, when it comes to your health. How do you know what to believe? To provide some insights and even give you some tools, I've asked Steven Brill.

STEVEN BRILL: Well, here's the need to create it a nutshell. If you think about how we consume media before the internet, just think about a library. You go into a library, books are neatly arranged on shelves according to subject matter. You take a book or magazine off the shelf and you can read the book jacket and it tells you, there's something about the author, tells you who the publisher is. You can get a sense of whether you want to read that and the credentials of what you're going to be reading.

Now, imagine you walked into a library and instead, there were 2 billion pieces of paper just flying around in the air. You grab one out of the air, you start to read it. You don't know who's financing it, you don't know what their credentials are, you have no idea what their agenda is and worst of all, there's no librarian there to tell you something about all that, the way there is in a library. That's the internet, that's your Facebook feed, that's your Twitter feed, that's your Google search, that's your Bing search. That's everything on the internet, everything--

JOHN WHYTE: But Steven, sometimes in some ways people might be thinking, and this is why I think there's analogy, it's in the library. So even though there's billions of pieces of paper around, it's in the library, it must be OK. So--

STEVEN BRILL: Well, a library is a library.

JOHN WHYTE: --internet, it's OK.

STEVEN BRILL: People who care about content. Facebook is not a library and the people running Facebook are not librarians. They don't much care apparently about the reliability of what they're serving up.

And in fact, they don't even-- their claim is they don't even serve it up to you, it's everybody else. It's a platform. So anybody can be a publisher. Now, the good thing about the internet is that anybody can be a publisher, which makes it much more democratic. The bad thing about the internet is that anybody can be a publisher.

14 - EXCHANGE OF CLUB BANNERS

One of the colorful traditions of many Rotary clubs is the exchange of small banners, flags or pennants. Rotarians traveling to distant locations often take banners to exchange at "make up" meetings as a token of friendship. Many clubs use the decorative banners they have received for attractive displays at club meetings and district events.

The Rotary International board recognized the growing popularity of the banner exchange back in 1959 and suggested that those clubs which participate in such exchanges give careful thought to the design of their banners in order that they be distinctive and expressive of the community and country of which the club is a part. It is recommended that banners include pictures, slogans or designs which portray the territorial area of the club.

The board was also mindful of the financial burden such exchange may impose upon some clubs, especially in popular areas where many visitors make up and request to exchange. In all instances, clubs are cautioned to exercise discretion and moderation in the exchange of banners in order that the financial obligations do not interfere with the basic service activities of the club.

Exchanging club banners is a very pleasant custom, especially when a creative and artistic banner tells an interesting story of community pride. The exchange of banners is a significant tradition of Rotary and serves as tangible symbol of our international fellowship.
