Dr. Deborah German VP Health Affairs & Dean UCF Medical School

Dr. Deborah German, a physician, educator, and administrator, is Vice President of Health Affairs for the University of Central Florida and the Founding Dean of the College of Medicine. Dr. German received her M.D. from Harvard Medical School. She was a Resident in Internal Medicine at Rochester and a Fellow in Rheumatic and Genetic Diseases at Duke, where she was a researcher in the Howard Hughes Medical Institute. She was the Associate Dean of Medical Education at Duke and later the Senior Associate Dean of Medical Education at Vanderbilt University. She served as President and Chief Executive Officer at Saint Thomas Hospital in Nashville where she led a successful hospital turnaround that received national recognition.

As Vice President of UCF Health Affairs and Dean, College of Medicine, Dr. German has led the development of a research-based medical school and a patient-centered clinical enterprise that anchors the growing UCF Academic Health Sciences Campus in Lake Nona.



April 4: <u>It's time to consider relaxing mask requirements on flights</u> (Washington Post)

In this op-ed, <u>Joseph Allen</u>, associate professor of exposure assessment science and director of the <u>Healthy Buildings</u> program, argued for lifting mask requirements during flights because "one of the safest parts of an entire trip is when travelers are seated in the airplane and the systems are running." Allen also recommended that airplanes keep their systems running when they're parked at the gate, and that airlines require people to mask when boarding and disembarking, "when there is greater mixing of people in the cabin and when people are exerting themselves more and therefore emitting more respiratory particles."

March 29: <u>F.D.A. Allows Second Coronavirus Boosters for Everyone</u> <u>50 and Older</u> (New York Times)

People aged 50 and older are now eligible for a second COVID-19 booster, although experts continue to debate just how helpful these boosters will be. At this point, "each additional dose is offering marginal value," said Eric Rubin, adjunct professor of immunology and infectious diseases at Harvard Chan School and a member of the FDA's vaccine advisory committee. He said that what's most needed now is a vaccine that works better against the new variants.

39 - THE ROTARY FOUNDATION'S BEGINNING

Some magnificent projects grow from very small seeds. The Rotary Foundation had that sort of modest beginning. In 1917 RI President Arch Klumph told the delegates to the Atlanta Convention that "it seems eminently proper that we should accept endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world." The response was polite and favorable, but the fund was slow to materialize. A year later the "Rotary Endowment Fund," as it was first labeled, received its first contribution of \$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, which was the balance of the Kansas City Convention account following the 1918 annual meeting. Additional small amounts were annually contributed, but after six years it is reported that the endowment fund had only reached \$700. A decade later, The Rotary Foundation was formally established at the 1928 Minneapolis Convention. In the next four years the Foundation fund grew to \$50,000. In 1937 a \$2 million goal was announced for The Rotary Foundation, but these plans were cut short and abandoned with the outbreak of World War II.

In 1947, upon the death of Paul Harris, a new era opened for the Rotary Foundation as memorial gifts poured in to honor the founder of Rotary. From that time, The Rotary Foundation has been achieving its noble objective of furthering "understanding and friendly relations between peoples of different nations." By 1954 the Foundation received for the first time a half million dollars in contributions in a single year, and in 1965 a million dollars was received.

It is staggering to imagine that from those humble beginnings, The Rotary Foundation is now receiving more than \$85 million each year for educational and humanitarian work around the world.
