# Rotary International 2022-2023 President Jennifer Jones

Rotary International's first female president, is the perfect leader to spread the word about the good Rotary does in the world, and inspire its members to keep going.

Jones, 55, was born in Windsor, Ontario, and — save for a few post-college years working in the Turks and Caicos Islands and Manhattan — has lived there her whole life. The oldest of three children, she'd run lemonade stands to earn money to give to charity, and recalls organizing a carnival in her family's yard to benefit kids with muscular dystrophy. "Growing up, my parents had given us wings to do service in our community," she says. Today, her mom, dad, and one of her brothers and his wife are Rotarians. Her other brother created a painting that inspired Jones' presidential-theme ties and scarves.

Both Jones and Krayacich are originally from Windsor, but the two met in the Caribbean. Burned out after finishing university and working in the newsroom at a radio station, Jones took time off and worked at a resort in the Caribbean, while Krayacich, a physician, had just finished his internship in Toronto and went to the islands to go scuba diving. They struck up a friendship, and when they both eventually moved back to Windsor, they started dating and got married shortly thereafter.

Jones started her own television production company when she was in her late 20s, wowing bank officials with her business plan, negotiating a lease, and investing in hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of equipment. "I've always wanted to carve my own path," she says. "Sometimes that's meant taking risks and making yourself open to new experiences."

One of those was Rotary. As a rookie radio reporter in the late 1980s, she'd covered the organization and remembers attending club meetings where the members were nearly all men. "I remember feeling very intimidated by the experience," she says. "I was in my early 20s. It was the power brokers of the community." Fast forward to 1996, months after she'd started her business, Media Street Productions. The manager of the local cable station invited Jones to a meeting. She realized she had found her home. "It was clearly one of the greatest gifts I've ever received," she says. "I didn't think walking through the door that day that it would change the trajectory of my life."



#### **Long-Haul COVID and Fatigue**

Experts say that up to 30% of the people who've caught the COVID-19 infection worldwide have gone on to develop COVID symptoms that lasts weeks or months long after the virus clears from the body. Doctors call this condition long-haul COVID-19 or <u>long COVID</u>-19. Many people deal with ongoing chronic fatigue, or "post-viral fatigue." Symptoms can include brain fog and pain. Researchers note that around 7% of the people with mild to severe COVID-19 may have long-term symptoms.

One study that looked at 143 people who had severe COVID-19 found that 87% of the participants still had ongoing fatigue 2 months after they were initially admitted to the hospital. In milder cases, the fatigue may last 2-3 weeks from the time you test positive for COVID-19.

While experts aren't exactly sure what causes lasting fatigue and long COVID-19, some researchers say that the body's natural response may be thrown off after it comes in contact with certain types of infection.

Nearly 20 million lives were saved by COVID-19 <u>vaccines</u> during their first year, but even more deaths could have been prevented if international targets for the shots had been reached, researchers reported Thursday.

On Dec. 8, 2020, a retired shop clerk in England received the first shot in what would become a global vaccination campaign. Over the next 12 months, more than 4.3 billion people around the world lined up for the vaccines.

The effort, though marred by persisting inequities, prevented deaths on an unimaginable scale, said Oliver Watson of Imperial College London, who led the new modeling study.

"Catastrophic would be the first word that comes to mind," Watson said of the outcome if vaccines hadn't been available to fight the <u>coronavirus</u>. The findings "quantify just how much worse the pandemic could have been if we did not have these vaccines."

The researchers used data from 185 countries to estimate that vaccines prevented 4.2 million COVID-19 deaths in India, 1.9 million in the United States, 1 million in Brazil, 631,000 in France and 507,000 in the United Kingdom.

#### **OUR ROTARY FAMILY**

Last Wednesday Tom, Rgiane & Francisco participated of Rotary Means Business organized by Lake Mary. There were 75+ people and it was a very interesting event.



Hi Norma (and fellow Windermere Rotarians),

from Greg Anderson

It's been a whirlwind 20 days in Southern Africa. I totally forgot to send updates along the way, but would be happy to do an informal presentation or fill in for a cancelled speaker one Tuesday. Thought you'd enjoy a few highlights:

12 flights, 7 different accommodations in 3 countries: South Africa, Botswana and Zimbabwe). (Boated into Zambia but that doesn't count.)

Saw the Big 5: elephants, lions, Cape buffalo, Rhino and a leopard- all on the first morning safari!

Stayed in three completely different safari lodges all in private parks and secluded from tour groups. Two were accessible by bush plane only and one 12 room camp (Camp Okavango) was on an island operated 100% on solar power. Our group of 12 were the only guests there so the itinerary was totally up to us.

We did 9 safaris: some in open air Land Cruisers, on solar powered pontoon boats, in dug out canoes and on foot with Zulu tribesmen and their rifles. Each experience was different.

We were (almost) never in danger. We did get charged by a bull elephant on our way to our bush plane on the grass landing strip in Okavango. He was between us and the plane and the standoff

was tense. He charged three steps from 100 feet away and when we stood our ground (as our guides taught us) he retreated. The next day in Chobe we were charged-twice- by smaller elephants who also retreated quickly.

The 18 foot crocodile that we were 6 feet away from on our pontoon safari stayed asleep-thankfully.

We then visited Victoria Falls and hung out in a couple small towns - both with remarkably great local breweries.

In Cape Town we saw Table Mountain, visited a couple awesome wineries, watched African penguins in the wild, and climbed to the lighthouse at the Cape of Good Hope.


Our group visited Christel House school in Cape Town. CH is a global charity I have supported for 16 years and it was a thrill to be able to attend the last day of school before winter break. I could do an entire presentation just on CH and the amazing work they do educating the poorest of the poor in South Africa, Mexico, India, Jamaica and the US. We had a wonderful tour and presented the CEO and Headmaster with a commitment to pay for, configure and ship their first two 3D printers to support their robotics curriculum.

We are now in Durban on the last leg of the trip. Today we spend time at the Hillcrest Aids Center Trust which raises money to address those affected and the effect of Aids on the local community. They have a program whereby local craftspeople and artists sell their items to generate income and business skills and we were fortunate to spend time talking with many of the folks.

#### **Humanitarian Crisis Response Award**



This award recognizes individuals and organizations who provide exemplary disaster response services for highly vulnerable communities. In doing so, they accentuate the value of life and provide an exemplary model for us all.

The 2022 Humanitarian Crisis Response Award recipient is Ted Higgins. Dr. Higgins is a surgeon who has devoted his career to his patients, and teaching surgery in third world countries, in particular Haiti. He was introduced to third world surgery as a fourth-year surgical resident at Yale when he and his wife spent 3 months in Haiti operating at the Albert Schweitzer Hospital. After Ted

finished his vascular surgery fellowship at Baylor, his family moved to Kansas City, his wife's hometown. Soon Ted was making yearly surgical mission trips with his church to the Dominican Republic helping train their surgeon in general, laparoscopic, and vascular surgical techniques. This lasted until 2010, when the catastrophic Haitian earthquake occurred, and Ted returned to Haiti.

He again started working with Haitian surgical residents from the General Hospital in Port Au Prince. The tiny delivery room, though, used for surgery was inadequate, particularly for teaching, so the <u>Higgins Brothers Surgicenter for Hope</u> was constructed in 2016. This contained 2 major operating rooms for teaching and performing surgeries. He soon hired several talented Haitian surgeons he helped train to avoid their leaving Haiti. They established a surgical team and set up a 24/7 trauma and emergency facility that now performs general, vascular, urology, obstetrics, and gynecology procedures. A nearby medical clinic was soon incorporated in to the Surgicenter that included medical, pediatric, HIV, maternity, and dental patients. When Hurricane Matthew struck Haiti in 2016 and Hurricane Laura in 2020, the Surgicenter provided not only emergency medical care but also shelter, food, and water for hundreds of local residents. Even amid the Covid pandemic, in roughly 19,000 patients were cared for at the Surgicenter and clinics in 2021.
